
Sierra Madre

t's hard to be stressed in Sierra Madre. With its pastoral tree-lined streets, charming diminutive downtown, and nary a traffic signal in sight, this hillside hamlet at the foot of the San Gabriel Mountains beckons visitors to slow down and unwind. Here, many homes are listed as historical monuments, and most shops and restaurants are locally owned. Tucked between Pasadena and Arcadia, Sierra Madre boasts an approximately 250-ton wisteria vine deemed the world's largest flowering plant by the Guinness Book of World Records, providing the town its unofficial symbol.

T-NEER TEA ROOM

Carrying on the tradition of her grandfather who had a tearoom in Sri Lanka, owner Aruna Kumar opened this hot spot last year. The daily soups get high marks, and tea selections include more than 100 varieties. 142 W. Sierra Madre Boulevard. (626) 355-3999; tneer.com.

BAILEY CANYON

Hikers can choose from trails of varying lengths and elevation gains in this wooded canyon at the edge of the Angeles National Forest. SIERRA MADRE PLAYHOUSE

This 99-seat theater, which was first called the Wistaria Theater in the 1920s, stages well-reviewed musicals such as Stephen Sondheim's *Putting It Together*, along with mysteries and comedies generally suitable for the whole family. 87 W. BELLE'S NEST

Sister duo Gloria Prins and Elena Alonzo curate a collection of handcrafted creations (including their own candles and jewelry), along with other locally made goods and vintage finds. Workshops are
